

- 1. Airport Fuel Options: John Wolff of Western Petroleum Co. led discussion about petroleum availability, namely 80/87 octane. Points made by John Wolff are included on attached fact sheet entitled "Some Facts About . . . Aviation Gasoline 80/87".
- 2. A.I.P. (Airport Improvement Program): There were unanimous comments on quality of work and overall good attitude of contractor on this job. Striping of runway and taxiway will be completed July 27.
- 3. T-Hangar Progress Report: Bid documents and engineer's estimate are ready and will be published when Port gives notice.
- 4. Above Ground Fuel Tanks Update: Informed committee of a meeting with engineers 7-18-95. Tentative plans are for one 10,000 gallon tank for Jet-A and one 12,000 gallon tank with two 6,000 gallon compartments.
- 5. Farmers Irrigation District: Pressurized Irrigation System Report information only would allow Port to fully utilize water rights to maintain grass without pump system.
- 6. Replacement of Committee Member: Motion by John Benton with a second by Roy Cederstam that Grant Porter serve as a member of the Airport Advisory Committee. Discussion: This position is presently occupied by Sterling Hanel. Sterling has gone on record as requesting to serve but not as a member of the committee. Sterling will receive certificate of recognition and be given honorary lifetime membership on the Advisory Committee. Vote: Unanimous Aye.



## Some Facts About ... Aviation Gasoline 80/87

#### **Current Supplier:**

Western Petroleum from Union Oil Company in Portland, Oregon, refined in Los Angeles, California; present inventory in Portland -- 105,000 gallons.

Union Oil Company has advised us that they are currently no longer refining 80/87. That product is permanently discontinued.

#### New Supplier:

Western Petroleum from Kern Oil Company of Bakersfield, California.

Kern Oil is an independent refiner that has refined 80/87 octane aviation fuel for years.

### Some Facts to Consider:

- 1. Until <u>after</u> Union Oil's announcement of discontinuing 80/87, Kern Oil's price was as much as .11¢ higher than Union's.
- 2. Today, Kern Oil is pricing the same as Union Oil.
- 3. Historically, Kern Oil has been erratic in their production schedule of 80/87.
- 4. Historically, Kern Oil has been erratic in their Quality Control.

Union Oil's distribution has been taken over the sea route from Los Angeles to the Northwest (Portland) at .05¢ per gallon.

Kern Oil will be shipping 80/87 to the Northwest by rail car or tank truck at about .25¢ per gallon.

The demand for 80/87 is steadily falling.
